

Orange County

Interesting, rewarding, informative and enjoyable are words that describe the annual Achievement Program of the Orange County ECA Council which was held Saturday, December 6, 2014 at the Russell Steakhouse in Hillsborough, NC with about 50 members and guests in attendance.

County Council president, Barbara Warren presided exhibiting her enthusiasm for, confidence in, and appreciation for all of the County ECA accomplishments. Secretary, Becky Smith gave an inspirational thought to which each person could relate. Greetings from the Orange County Board of Commissioners was given by commissioner Barry Jacobs who indicated that he had been in attendance and asked to make remarks for the past 3 years. He also stated that ECA was an impressive organization dealing with community and its needs. Looking at the Collect by Mary Stewart, he indicated that it contained a message for other organizations as well. Commissioner Jacobs also complimented and congratulated retiring Register of Deeds of Orange County, Deborah Brooks, also an ECA member. He ended his greetings by thanking the group for all it does for Orange County.

Cooperative Extension Director Carl Matyac greeted the group and complimented it on the many years of community volunteerism. He noted the organizations archival documentation, activities in family issues, food preparation and nutrition, and the ability to share and work together. The newly elected chair of the Orange County Board of Commissioners, Earl McKee was also present and commented that his mother was a dedicated ECA member. President Warren gave each of these gentlemen a copy of the newly published ECA History book.



Each ECA County club had to complete and turn into the ECA office a score card by November 1, 2014. Based on the

information listed on these cards, awards were made for special projects and other activities. Listed is a summary of the special project items: Cancelled stamps 13,153; Campbell soup labels/Box Tops for Education- 1451; Fish eye patches for school use- 6701; cancer caps- 52; mastectomy pillows- 17; mastectomy tote bags- 29; aluminum drink tabs for Ronald McDonald House- 18.75 lbs.; eyeglasses for underdeveloped countries- 74 pr.; cultural arts entries- 8; Operation Christmas Child- 117 shoe boxes; lap quilts/ packages for shut-ins- 704. Every club received a gold certificate for its accomplishments.

Great items were donated for the silent auction which raised \$180. The gross amount from the 50/50 raffle was \$1805 of which the winner received \$902.50. The ECA member who "sold" the winning ticket had purchased tickets in the names of several people in the community whom she thought could use an unexpected windfall. In choosing her names she thought about people who may really need the money. The winner was a single father with 2 teenage sons. Someone is going to have a very special Christmas.

Ann Fernald made presentations to the Cultural Arts winners and also provided the table decorations. Frances Vanhooke was recognized for 50 years of membership in ECA. Betty Matthews and Pat Stewart were recognized for 25 years of membership. Barbara Warren expressed appreciation to retired ECA agent Alice Pettit and Agent Deborah Taylor for all they have done to make ECA a successful community organization.

The program ended with the installation of incoming officers by Deborah Brooks.
